

## **Tips for Writing a Testimonial**

Having made a decision to leave a legacy to one or more organizations you value, we encourage you to write a brief statement (up to 150 words) about yourself, your family or philosophy, which can serve as a message for future generations and encourage others to leave a legacy as well.

	ere are some suggestions to help you get started crafting a statement that reflects your values and your mmitment to the
1.	Instead of trying to compose just the right number of words for the page, take a separate sheet of paper and <b>write</b> as much as you want. It's much simpler to take what you've written, make choices, and edit the long story down to a short one.
	There is no required formula or guidelines for the type of material you may want to include in your entry. However, you could answer any of the following:
	<ul> <li>When did your family arrive in the U.S. and from where?</li> <li>What or who were your greatest influences in shaping your Jewish identity and/or commitment to supporting the Jewish community?</li> <li>What is most significant to you about being Jewish?</li> <li>How would you like to be remembered?</li> <li>What are your hopes for the Jewish community of the future?</li> <li>Why did you choose to make this legacy gift commitment?</li> <li>What do you hope to accomplish with this gift?</li> <li>Is there anything else you would like to mention?</li> </ul>
2.	Create your 150-word statement based upon the above.
